Well, it's that time of year again! Here is a look at our year in review for 2022.

This year was definitely a return to full programming and activities after the pandemic. Our summer reading programs were very well attended as those who tried to get parking spaces can attest to.

The Solar project was completed at the library and we had a lovely ribbon cutting ceremony at the end of the summer. Pop into the library and take a look at our realtime monitoring display of the system.

Two new databases were added to the library. this year. The first is a Proquest database that provides access to many major dailies including The Boston Globe, Chicago Tribune, Los Angeles Times, New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, and The Washington Post. The other is Fold3 that provides access to military records to supplement our other genealogy resources.

The library received ARPA grant money in the amount of \$14,353.00, and we purchased the

We said good-bye to Kathy Roche on our circulation staff and welcomed Samantha Anderson in her place. Elaine Rittenhouse retired from full-time service after 28 years but remains with us part-time. Jo-Ann Houde was promoted to the fulltime cataloguing position that was as a result of Elaine's shift in duties.

We successfully secured funding to move forward with relaying our brick walkway. Work will be completed in 2023.

Eagle Scout Aidan Whitaker completed his Eagle project at the library, and we now have an outdoor, full-size chess board on our side lawn.

Girl Scout troop 10763 completed their Silver Award project at the library, rebuilding and replanting our raised beds with sustainable, perennial, pollinator attracting plants. They have a plan for indefinite upkeep!

This completes my fourth full year as library director. I am grateful for the support that the library received from the town administration as well as the residents of Windham during this year of change. It is a pleasure working with this great staff, board of trustees, Friends of the Library of Windham volunteers, and the countless other volunteers who give of their time to make the library a wonderful community asset.

We all look forward to serving our entire community in 2023!

12,000 Years Ago in the Granite State



The native Abenaki people played a central role in the history of the Monadnock region, defending it against English settlement and forcing the abandonment of Keene and other Monadnock area towns during the French and Indian Wars. On Thursday, January 19 at 6:30 p.m., Dr. Robert Goodby will be here to talk about the Abenaki. and the conventional histories that often depict the first Europeans entering an untamed, uninhabited wilderness, rather than the homeland of people who had been there for hundreds of generations. Dr.

Goodby will discuss how the real depth of Native history was revealed when an archaeological study, prior to construction of the new Keene Middle School, discovered traces of four structures dating to the end of the Ice Age. Undisturbed for 12,000 years, the site revealed information about the economy, gender roles, and household organization of the Granite State's very first inhabitants, as well as evidence of social networks that extended for hundreds of miles across northern New England.

This program is funded with a generous grant from New Hampshire Humanities, and we are pleased to co-host this event with the Windham Historical Society.

Robert Goodby is a professor of Anthropology at Franklin Pierce University in Rindge. He holds a Ph.D. in anthropology from Brown University and has spent the last 30 years studying Native American archaeological sites in New England. He is a past president of the New Hampshire Archeological Society and a former trustee of the Mount Kearsarge Indian Museum in Warner, and he served on the New Hampshire Commission on Native American Affairs. In 2010. he directed the excavations of four 12,000-year-old Paleoindian dwellings at the Tenant Swamp site in Keene, and his book. A Deep Presence: 13,000 Years of Native American History, was published in 2021.

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CASA Information Sessions



Have you thought about being a CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) volunteer, but were unsure what it entails or the commitment involved? On Tuesday, January 24 at 11:00 a.m., and on Wednesday, January 25 at 6:30 p.m., CASA advocates will be here to talk about their work and answer your questions. CASA volunteers are ordinary women and men who step forward to advocate in New Hampshire's court system for children who have experienced abuse and neglect. Volunteers spend time getting to know the child or children they are working with and gather information from the important adults in each child's life, so they may make qualified, unbiased recommendations to a judge about what they believe to be in the best interests of the child. Join us to see how you can help! No registration required.




Teen Happenings


